WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

Ed- Welcomed everyone to the meeting and reminded folks on the Zoom call to mute themselves and do introductions through the chat as this helps to capture attendance in notes.

AGENDA

Agenda and past minutes were sent out in a previous email.

Ed - Covered the agenda for the meeting and turned it over to Boone for a monthly program update.

Boone – FireFree will be kicking off April 30 and running to June 4 with Knott operating April 30-May15 before turning to the transfer sites which run May 21- June 4. More details can be found at www.FireFree.org If you are interested in volunteering contact Boone.

Firewise communities continue to be active with many communities planning events throughout the county during the month of May. Many of these communities are looking for guest speakers. If you are interested in meeting with a community contact Boone. Boone also shared his tracking of all Firewise sites that are in process of obtaining recognition. There are several communities in each RFD. If you are interested in getting to know, or assisting these communities in reaching recognition contact Boone.

The Greater Redmond CWPP is under way with the second meeting planned for Wednesday April 20. Shortly after the April CWPP meeting the final DRAFT will be out for public review. The end goal is to have a final plan signed by the end of July.

Oregon State Fire Marshals will be putting on defensible space classes. The defensible space classes that Project Wildfire had planned for this spring will not be held since the OSFM classes

Ed - Introduced Cameron Scott as our guest speaker and set the stage for the topic for the month.

Meeting Topic

Federal Forest Restoration Program (FFRP) and Good Neighbor Authority (GNA) - Cameron Scott, Oregon Department of Forestry – GNA Coordinator

Cameron – Introduced himself and the topic. First Cameron covered a brief history of how the FFR program came about starting in 2009, the passing of GNA by congress, to the passing of SB762 in 2021. The core mission of FFR program is to "accelerate the pace, scale and quality of forest restoration to increase the resilience of Oregon's federal forests, in a manner that leverages collaborative efforts and contributes to the long term vitality of regional economies and rural communities."

Good Neighbor Authority is the mechanism that allows State agencies to enter into agreements with the federal forests to get the work done. GNA was authorized under the 2014 Farm Bill. Locally it has been in use since 2016. Activities include hazardous fuels treatments, insect and disease control, tree planting, habitat improvements and more.

The Forest Restoration Program puts out a report every year of accomplishments and planned activities. Cameron walked through the overall process of completing projects and discussed how and who does the work along with local examples of projects recently completed. Non-commercial work can be funded through GNA timber sales, Forest Service appropriated funds or ODF "crew dollars". NEPA work can be funded through PACE grants. Pace funds are aimed to alleviate bottlenecks in the planning process. Along with the PACE grant there are several other grants utilized to facilitate the process of completing these projects.

Locally there are ODF crews conducting thinning and sale layout on both the Ochoco and Deschutes national forests. With all the work happening in FFR, the number of completed projects are expected to continue to increase making our forest more resilient. Not only has this increased the health of our forest, but there have also been several new jobs created.

At this time Cameron opened the discussion to questions.

Ed – Provided an example of how ODF has funded the collaborative locally including funding for a research project.

Dean Richardson – Do correction crews get used for these projects? Cameron – As of now the work has been getting done with ODF crews. There is a possibility of using the corrections crews in the future.

Ed – Will the recently announced funds (\$43.1 million) translate into funds that can be used for FFR? Do you know what ODF's involvement be with these funds? Cameron – This is something we have been discussing before the funds were announced in hopes of identifying process and projects in getting the needed work completed.

Boyd Turner – How does BLM fit into the program? Cameron – So far in Central Oregon BLM has been less active than western Oregon, but ODF is open to working BLM and FFR.

ROUNDTABLE

Ed Keith – In the meeting reminder sent via Constant Contact, there was info on SB762. ODF is looking for public input on the rules, there are 3 meetings happening this week that you can provide input at. You can also provide input by sending it to sb762rules.rulemaking@oregon.gov
